Spotlight Agency:

Barrier Free Alberta Election Campaign 2023

- BFA is targeting all candidates running for the Provincial election parties, and recommending they put accessibility legislation on their platforms.
- We have sent emails to all Chambers of Commerce throughout Alberta and Community Associations in Calgary to spread the word amongst all communities and book meetings with BFA for further clarification.
- We have 2 different types of posters, one for candidates and one for the public. Information is different as the 2 different demographics are focused on different topics.
- We are currently booking meetings with the Chambers of Commerce throughout Alberta, MLAs and candidates. More updates will be provided once we meet with them.
- Our first presentation was on April 3rd with MLA Marie Renaud.
- BFA has created a monthly newsletter that will be sent to all supporters that register above. The next newsletter will be the following Monday.

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- A social media blitz is being developed and will be sent out on the 27th or 28th.
- We need to share this information outside the disability sector.
- Accessibility legislation largely helps people with disabilities, but it helps everyone in general. For example, plain language helps people with intellectual disabilities, but it will also help a person whose first language isn't English.

- City of Edmonton Accessibility Advisory Committee and other stakeholders have not used the same language that Barrier-Free Alberta is using.

University of Calgary

- Alan Martino and Meaghan Edwards from the University of Calgary have decided to do desire-based research based on poverty reduction.
- In the field of disability, usually damage-centred research is conducted to document pain and loss such as poverty or poor health.
- Desire research focuses on painful elements of social realities, wisdom, and hope.
- Possibly starting this research locally (only Calgary) and moving provincially when appropriate.
- They will include community partners with lived experience. Additionally, they want to create a committee of people with lived experience that can help lead this project.
- Humanizing the experience through digital storytelling and connecting with the Arts community.
- They will be applying to a catalyst grant through the University to launch this project and get some external and internal help.
- Keith is doing work with the Faculty of Social Work in the University of Calgary already and would be interested in joining us for the digital storytelling piece.
- Want to change the narrative of how people with disabilities contribute to society and how poverty is portrayed.
- Society hasn't moved past valuing people for their productivity and their contributions to society.

- There is no particular deadline for the project or the community engagement piece. The grant they're applying for is quarterly and the next deadline is May 15^{th.}

Vivienne Momoh – PHD Candidate

- Vivienne is presenting on the inaccessibility of available resources during the transition from Family Support for Children with Disabilities (FSCD) to Persons with Developmental Disabilities (PDD) services.
- As a parent to a person with a disability who has gone through the transition from FSCD to PDD, Vivienne wanted to make the process easier and started researching how to improve the process.
- This research is to produce a report that informs future government decision-making on the accessibility of available resources during the transition.
- Participation in this study will require you to attend two sessions within a 12-month investigative period. The first meeting is a 90-minute focus group or individual meeting over zoom and a second follow-up for 30 minutes.
- Results will be compiled into policy briefs and other materials for policymakers.
